RADIOACTIVE SUBSTANCES ACT 1993

Application from Dounreay Site Restoration Ltd for a revised authorisation for the disposal of radioactive waste arising from the decommissioning of the Dounreay Site and for the accumulation of radioactive waste.

SEPA has determined the application made by Dounreay Site Restoration Limited (DSRL) for an authorisation for the disposal of radioactive waste from the decommissioning of the Dounreay site and for the accumulation of radioactive waste outwith the Nuclear Licensed Site.

SEPA has issued a new authorisation to DSRL. This authorisation will replace the three extant authorisations currently held by DSRL. The Annual Authorised limits for the disposal of gaseous and liquid waste have been either reduced or kept at the same level. The disposal of low level waste has been authorised to anyone who holds an authorisation for the treatment, storage or disposal of that waste, where this is the Best Practicable Means for the disposal of that waste. This replaces the previous practice of naming the individual waste recipient in the authorisation. The transfer of waste arising from the on-site destruction of imported sodium metal and the transfer of waste arising from the reprocessing overseas nuclear material has been retained in the authorisation in line with Government policy. SEPA has included a revised programme for the monitoring of local beaches for fragments of irradiated nuclear fuel (particles). The accumulation of the redundant radioactive aqueous liquid waste discharge system pipework, which is located off the Nuclear Licensed Site, has been authorised.

In addition, SEPA has revoked the authorisation held by AEA Technology for the onward disposal of waste arising from the on-site destruction of the imported sodium metal.

SEPA reached this determination having taken into account the responses made to the public consultation, further statutory consultation, the information supplied by DSRL, international recommendations on radiological protection and Government policy. SEPA concluded that the limitations and conditions of the authorisation will, if adhered to, effectively protect human health, the safety of the food chain and the environment generally.
